LIONS CLUB NEWS

The annual Halloween Parade will be held October 23, 2007, beginning at 7PM. It will form at the old AMP building behind the Tops Restaurant at 6 PM. The fire siren will sound at 6:30 to indicate the parade will march. In case of rain, the judging will take place in the Borough gym. Registration to participate in the parade will be done October 16, 17, and 18, in the Good Shepherd Library from 6-8 PM each evening.

PAXTANG EVENT - CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF EDUCATION

Paxtang Elementary School, established in 1907, is holding an Open House Style, 100th Anniversary celebration from 8 AM to NOON on Saturday, November 3, 2007, at the school, located at 3530 Rutherford Street. Students, alumni, parents, and interested historians from Paxtang and beyond are invited to tour the school, visit with old friends and enjoy the activities and entertainment. There will be strolling musicians, a barber-shop quartet and actors dressed in period costumes. Members of the historical society will showcase photos and artifacts from the early years of the school. One or more antique automobiles will be on display outside the school throughout the event.

The morning will kick off with a pancake breakfast in the school cafeteria, made possible by the Paxtang Lions Club. Tickets will be available in advance and at the door.

Paxtang residents and school children are invited to participate in an old-fashioned bake-off, providing cookies, cakes and pies, which will be judged in different categories by a panel of teachers. Winners in three categories will receive a blue ribbon for their culinary efforts.

Cookbooks with recipes from Paxtang students and their families will be sold at the event with proceeds going to support school activities.

In honor of the centennial, commemorative bricks will be sold to any individual or business who wishes to show their support of Paxtang in a meaningful and long-lasting way. Bricks will be engraved with up to three lines of text. (Example: The Ronald Smith Family, Paxtang 2007.) Cost for the engraved bricks will be \$35, and again, proceeds will benefit school programs.

Throughout the 2007/2008 school year, Paxtang students will be learning more history as part of the curriculum, they will have the opportunity to play old-fashioned games (marbles, checkers, pit-shooting, etc.), and will eat lunches that may have been served in the early 1900s.

LEAF COLLECTION IS FAST APPROACHING

The annual collection of leaves is almost upon us and here are some helpful hints that will make collection easier for the Borough Employees:

- ⇒ Rake your leaves only to the curb, and not into the street.
- ⇒ Take any and all sticks or branches out of the leaves. Those items clog the leaf machine and slows down the collection process.
- ⇒ Try to time your raking with the week employees are scheduled to come to your "side" so that if it rains, the leaves do not get heavy in the pile.
- ⇒ If at all possible, don't park near leaf piles. This allows truck drivers to get close to the curb for easier collection of leaves.

To simplify collection, the Borough is divided into two "sides" as follows: From 29th Street to Park Terrace Street is designated as the "upper side" and from the Greenbelt to Wilhelm Road is designated as the "lower side".

Leaf collection will begin on Monday, October 29, 2007, and will go on for about six weeks, starting with the "upper side". Work will be done one "side" a week unless Borough Employees have additional time. In that case, they will pick up larger piles from the other "side".

PAXTANG SCHOOL TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENTS

Some improvements around Paxtang Elementary School have been made in response to concerns regarding student safety. When driving to, from, or past the school, please keep student safety your number one goal. Improvements include:

1. New crosswalks at the intersections of Rutherford Street with Swan Street and Walnut Street, and Montour Street with Walnut Street and Swan Street. (Walnut Street is the alley west of and adjacent to school property.) Parents: Please use these crosswalks for your own safety and to set an example for your child.
2. Curb corners are painted yellow to designate no parking. Please do not park or stop your vehicle adjacent to yellow curbs as this can obscure the view for drivers and pedestrians and could create an unsafe situation.
3. Parking is prohibited on a portion of the north side of Rutherford Street, adjacent to the school for bus traffic. Please do not park or stop your vehicle in this area.
4. Parking on Walnut Street is prohibited. Please do not park or stop your vehicle on Walnut Street - it encourages students to walk through parked vehicles directly onto the street, where they are not easily seen.

For the safety of our students, please obey all traffic signs and markings, and follow any instructions given by police officers or school personnel. Failure may result in being ticketed. In addition, consider the following ways to further improve safety.

1. **WALK TO SCHOOL.** If you cannot, try asking a trusted neighbor to walk with your child or allow children to walk with other students. The location of our school is ideal for walking which decreases congestion, improves safety around the school, saves fuel, and gives the children exercise and opportunity to socialize with other children.
2. **WALK PART WAY.** If your walk is too far, try parking a block or two away from the school and walking the rest of the way.
3. **TRY CARPOOLING.** Take turns driving several students from your neighborhood. Again, this will reduce congestion, improve safety around the school, and save fuel. It's also an opportunity for children to socialize with other children before they get to school.
4. **USE MONTOUR STREET FOR DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP.** Avoid using Rutherford Street and Swan Street adjacent to the school for travel and parking. Instead, try accessing Montour Street from Paxtang Avenue and loading and unloading your child at the curb adjacent to the school property, between Walnut Street and Swan Street. Then exit the school area by turning left onto Swan Street (up the hill) or going straight through at Swan Street, continuing on Montour Street. This will reduce the number of cars mixing with buses and pedestrians in front of the school.
5. **AVOID THE AREA.** If you do not have a child at Paxtang Elementary, try to avoid the streets adjacent to the school during drop-off and pick-up times.

FOOD SAFETY TIPS

Food safety tips from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Food Safety and Inspection Service:

1. Wash your produce. Rinse fruits and vegetables and rub firm-skin fruits and vegetables under running tap water, including those with skins and rinds that are not to be eaten. Also, remember to clean lids before opening.
2. Prevent cross-contamination. Use one cutting board for fresh produce and a separate one for raw meat, poultry, and seafood. Wash cutting boards, dishes, utensils, and counter tops with hot, soapy water after preparing each food item and before you go on to the next food item. A solution of one tablespoon of unscented, liquid, chlorine bleach in one gallon of water may also be used to sanitize washed surfaces and utensils.
3. When you prepare food, wash your hands with soap and warm water before and after handling food, after using the bathroom, changing diapers, or handling pets.
4. When you cook food, you should check the internal temperature to kill microorganisms that can cause illness. The recommended internal temperatures for the following items are: steaks, roasts and fish - 145 degrees; pork, ground beef, and egg dishes - 160 degrees; chicken and poultry - 165 degrees. Food thermometers to check internal temperatures are readily available at supermarkets and kitchen shops.
5. Chilling foods properly is very important. You should refrigerate or freeze meat, poultry, eggs, seafood, and other perishable items within two hours of cooking or purchase. Divide large amounts of leftovers into smaller shallow containers to allow for more rapid cooling.
6. Food should never be thawed at room temperature, such as on the counter. You can safely thaw frozen food in the refrigerator, in cold water, or in the microwave.
7. Food items such as cookies, crackers, bread, and whole fruit are exceptions to the above temperature rules and are not considered potentially hazardous foods.

TAX COLLECTOR

As of August 31st, 90% of borough property owners have paid their 2007 County/Borough Real Estate Taxes, and 84% have paid the 2007 School Real Estate Taxes. EMS TAX RECEIVES NAME CHANGE

In 2008, the Emergency and Municipal Services Tax (\$52/year) will be known as the Local Services Tax (Act 7 of 2007). The amount will remain at \$52/year for all persons earning income in Paxtang. The few changes will be listed in the information

NEW PAXTANG BOROUGH ORDINANCES

- **OPEN BURNING:** Outside burning is limited to food preparation and leisure. Burn containers must be covered with a metal screen when in use, and cannot be larger than 9 sq. ft X 2 ft. high. Burnable materials are limited to propane, natural gas, charcoal and wood (unpainted and untreated only.) No burning is permitted on Red Flag Days, as defined by the National Weather Service. (We are working on a method to notify the public about Red Flag Days.) Burning must be attended at all times by a responsible individual, 16 years or older. No burning is permitted within 15 feet of any building, structure, property line or sidewalk, or under a roof or building protrusion. Special burning permits may be granted by the Fire Chief for a fee. Fines range from \$100-\$1,000, or 30 days imprisonment.
- **RENTAL PROPERTY MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTIONS:** This existing ordinance has been amended under Miscellaneous Provisions. Property owners must procure appropriate building permits for construction work required to correct violations.
- **LEASH LAW:** No animals are permitted to be outdoors without a leash (this includes cats) anywhere except on the animal owner's property or residence. Animal owners are responsible for removing and disposing of feces of their animal everywhere except the owner's property. Animal owners must properly dispose of animal feces, with the exception of guide dogs. Fines range from \$75-\$600, or imprisonment for a maximum of 30 days.
- **NUISANCE:** This existing ordinance has been amended and is defined in section 8-2001 as keeping animals that annoy or disturb a number of persons with frequent howling, barking, noise, or odor. Fines range from \$75-\$600 or up to 30 days imprisonment.
